

"A Sasquatch Stole My CoB!"

Authorities warn that it may be necessary to keep gaming supplies under lock and key, due to an inexplicable sasquatch encounter this past week. "I just don't understand it," exclaimed Trella County Sheriff Don Wickwa. "We get rashes of sightings every year, but I've never heard of the beasts ever taking anything from people."

"I didn't even see it until it grabbed my copy of *Chain of Being*, the new fantasy roleplaying game from Limestone Publishing," claimed an irate Russell T. Weaks of South Wetpatch. Vatican Makes Ruling on Roleplaying Games



Earlier this week, in a surprise move for the Vatican, Pope John Paul II released an apostolic letter clarifying at last a matter of church doctrine which has been vigorously debated since the mid-1970s. This letter set to rest for the foreseeable future the old question of whether or not roleplaying games are a tool of Satan. The pope's answer, in short, was no. His Holiness startled some with this statement, but many were shocked when he actually went so far as to state that in his opinion, many roleplaying games are (in His words) "really fun" and that He Himself is, in fact, an avid gamer.

The pope has already received ample criticism for His statement, but John Paul has never shirked controversy before. His encyclicals "The Dangers of Genetic Manipulation," "Audiences on Original Sin," "Dignity and Vocation of Women," and "How Much I Love Snack Cakes." for example, have provoked much debate, and it seems that His stand on roleplaying will spark similarly strong feelings in believers and skeptics alike.

As John Paul elaborated in the letter, "roleplaying most like-

ly does not result in the corruption of one's soul, and it will almost certainly not bring about the apocalypse." The pope went on to add that roleplaying an evil character need not necessarily make you evil, as long as you don't do it on Sunday. A man of firm conviction with 23 solid years of His papacy behind Him, the pope is determined to make a strong case for the popular hobby which is now almost 30 years old.

For instance, in an interview with

TIME magazine, the pope revealed that the reason that the Dead Sea Scrolls have been kept from the world is that they contain ample evidence that the ancient Hebrews were gamers. "Enough is enough," the pope declared sharply. "It's about time somebody told the whole truth about those texts." The pope pooh-poohed the criticism that roleplaying encourages blood drinking and lurking around in underground tunnels with swords. "Anyone who says that it does is probably some sort of fundie," He added.

The pope then revealed that He has been roleplaying off and on since 1982, and that He has exchanged some correspon-

dence with Ε. Gary Gygax, cocreator of Dungeons n Dragons, the first modern roleplaying game. He spoke fondly of those vears, and mentioned that He has even talked


recently with higher-ups at Wizards of the Coast. "I don't like to toot my own horn, but I actually had some input into third edition," His Holiness revealed.

The pope's recent statement is already boosting sales for roleplaying industry giants like Wizards of the Coast and White Wolf Publishing. The pope also discussed passionately His interest in seeing the new fantasy roleplaying game from Limestone Publishing. "I hear it's supposed to come out sometime in 2002," the pope said with enthusiasm. "Frankly, some of the stuff I've read about it is downright hilarious."


Then the pope became somber. "Another thing I've been playing lately is *Little Fears*, that neat new game by Key 20 Publishing. Basically, I'm still just a kid at heart, and I have to admit I'm still terrified of closet monsters. I guess it's kind of therapeutic—the game helps me deal with my deepest insecurities."

Pope John Paul II is, in general, a very relaxed and gentle man. Still, for all His ease and charisma, He becomes slightly defensive when asked to justify His position on roleplaying. "I just like fighting imaginary dramatic battles against demonic foes," He stated. "I don't see what's so wrong with that."

Other Articles in Limestone Publishing News Found to Be Blatantly False!

In a study conducted by the Foundation for the Elimination of Propaganda Created for the Purpose of Producing, Marketing, and Distributing Roleplaying Games (FEPCPPMDRPG), issued later this week, information in the Limestone Publishing News was found to be largely false or misleading, says Mike Locathah,

founder of this independent industry watchdog. Locathah takes a hard-line approach to these violations. "We don't let them get away with these sorts of things," he stated. "If they're allowed to do it, soon the entire roleplaying and wargaming industry will be putting out these weird little newsletters, and the whole hobby will collapse into anarchy."

FEPCPPMDRPG correspondent Nicki Ettercap was more sympathetic. "How is a new company going to get anybody to pay attention to its products without making a few utterly preposterous claims?" she asked. Still, she also stated that she thought it was important to hold them to the facts, and she asked Limestone Publishing to please clarify whether the falsehoods in the Limestone Publishing News were simply errors or whether they were deliberate lies.

their credit, Limestone Publishing was forthcoming in admitting that their misrepresentation of certain facts had been deliberate. "It's true," sighed Limestone Publishing's Chief Relations Correspondent, Dan Geyer. "All that crap about the pope, stuff about sasquatch—it's just drivel, mostly. And some of those ads? Pure falderal." He hastened to add that since you can't raise your stats in real life, he wouldn't have thought anyone would have taken that Vitastat ad seriously. "But then, I can be pretty naive sometimes," he admitted.

In the wake of this public relations disaster for Limestone Publishing, LSP's Chief Internal Activities Coordination Facilitator Justin Williams stated, "Woe is us! The only thing we have going for us now is a good game. We'll just have to hope it comes out in time to weather us from the coming storm of criticism from the media."
